

## IYF ACTIVE GRANTS 2005

IYF provides grants on a solicited basis only. Believing that support is best offered by those closest to local realities, IYF offers grants primarily to its Partner organizations rather than individual programs. We support programs in our four core thematic areas: education, employability, health, and leadership and engagement. The following grants were active in 2005, and are listed by theme.
